

The Follow Me curriculum is based on practices Jesus did and taught us to do as faithful followers. Written for people of all ages who wish to live out their faith, this curriculum examines where these practices are found in the Bible and how they have been used in Christian faith then and now. These classes meet on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month for grades 2-5, middle school, high school, and adults.



Our focus practice in November and December is Hope. Hope is waiting in faith. It is not merely wishing for something to happen or hoping everything will work out if the stars align. Hope is waiting with anticipation—at times, with impatience—for what you know and believe is coming. In Hebrew, the word for rope and hope are the same. Hope is something outside of ourselves that tethers us to safety and helps us keep going, even when we can't see our way.

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb."

Here were two women. The one who had given up all hope of ever having children, and the other younger one who had no immediate plans to have a child. Yet, Mary went to Elizabeth with haste, she knew that she needed to see her. And when they met, Elizabeth and, no doubt, Mary were filled with the Holy Spirit. We can only imagine that they flew into each other's' arms and at that point the both knew, for certain, that these babies growing within them were no ordinary babies.

This banner is about that moment when they and the Holy Spirit were swept up together, and nothing was ever the same for them.
